Heather Curtis MD, FRCPC Program Director, Dalhousie University



Dr. Heather Curtis is the Program Director for the Diagnostic Radiology Residency Program at Dalhousie University. She graduated from Dalhousie Medical School in 2003, and completed her residency in Diagnostic Imaging at Dalhousie University in 2009. After completing Fellowship Training in Women's Imaging at the University of Toronto in 2010, she returned to Halifax as a staff radiologist at the IWK with a focus on Women's Imaging, and a cross-appointment at the QEII Health Sciences Centre in Breast Imaging. In 2012, Dr. Curtis joined the QEII Diagnostic Imaging group on a full-time basis, specializing in Breast and Abdominal Imaging. Dr. Curtis has a special interest in medical education, serving as a Past-President of the Nova Scotia Association of Radiologists, the Undergraduate Program Director for Diagnostic Radiology at Dalhousie (2012-2021), and Assistant **Program Director of the Diagnostic Radiology Residency** program before ultimately starting as Program Director in 2022.

Tim Dalseg MD, FRCPC

Clinical Educator, Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada



Dr. Tim Dalseg completed his medical school at Western University in 2009 and went on to acquire his Royal College Emergency Medicine certification through the University of Ottawa in 2014. Since that time he has worked at the University Health Network providing care at Toronto Western Hospital and Toronto General Hospital. In 2016 he completed his Fellowship in Medical Education from the Department of Innovation in Medical Education at the University of Ottawa and subsequently received his Masters in Medical Education through the University of Dundee in 2020.

In addition to his clinical work, Dr. Dalseg holds the position of Clinician Educator with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. In this role, Dr. Dalseg works closely with other educators to advance resident education with a particular focus on the design and implementation of Competence by Design, residency accreditation and educational program evaluation.

Nancy Dudek MD, FRCPC



Dr. Nancy Dudek is a Professor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Ottawa. She received her MD from Western University in 1999. She became a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in 2004 in the specialty of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. Dr. Dudek's academic interests are in Medical Education. Her focus is related to the assessment of medical students and residents with a particular interest in Workplace Based Assessment. Dr. Dudek has served as the University of Ottawa's undergraduate coordinator for Musculoskeletal Medicine and as the Director for the Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation Residency Program. She presently serves as a Clinician Educator at the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

Assistant Dean, Faculty Development - Uniformed Services University Associate Professor of Pediatrics - Uniformed Services University



Dr. Gayle "Hava" Haischer-Rollo is the Assistant Dean of Faculty Development and Associate Professor of Pediatrics at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, Maryland. Dr. Haischer-Rollo graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of North Texas, and her medical degree from University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. She completed her Pediatric residency and Neonatal Fellowship at San Antonio Uniformed Services Health Education Consortium in San Antonio, Texas. Joshua Hartzell MD, MS-HPEd, FACP, FIDSA

Vice-Chair of Faculty of Affairs, Uniformed Services University Professor of Medicine, Uniformed Services University



Dr. Joshua Hartzell serves as vice chair of Faculty Affairs in the Department of Health Professions Education at the Uniformed Services University. He holds a master of science degree in health professions education from Massachusetts General Hospital-Institute of Health Professions. A board-certified internist and Infectious Diseases physician, he is also professor of medicine at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences where he previously served as assistant dean for Faculty Development. Dr. Hartzell achieved the rank of colonel serving for 25 years in the United States Army. He was formerly program director for the National Capital Consortium Internal Medicine Residency and assistant chief of Graduate Medical Education.

Julie Johnstone MD, MScCH, FRCPC

Director of Assessment and Special Projects - Core Paediatrics, University of Toronto Director of Education - Division of Paediatric Medicine, Sick Children



Dr. Julie Johnstone is a Staff Paediatrician at the Hospital for Sick Children with a clinical interest in feeding and growth issues in the context of medical complexity and medical education focus on assessment. She did medical school at Western University where she was honored as class valedictorian and Paediatric Residency and Academic General Paediatric Fellowship at the University of Toronto where she was Chief Resident.

Within medical education, Dr. Johnstone has a MScCH in Health Practitioner Education. She has a focus in assessment in residency training and the implementation of Competence By Design. She is the Director of Assessment and Special Projects and Competence Committee Chair for the Core Paediatrics Residency Training Program at the University of Toronto, the Director of Education for the Division of Paediatric Medicine at the Hospital for Sick Children, and the Faculty Lead for Post Graduate Medical Education Assessment at the University of Toronto Temerty Faculty of Medicine.

Jolanta Karpinski MD, MEd, FRCPC

Division Head of Nephrology. University of Ottawa Nephrologist, Ottawa Hospital



Dr. Jolanta Karpinski is a nephrologist at The Ottawa Hospital working mostly in renal transplantation, the Division Head of Nephrology at the University of Ottawa, and a clinician educator with experience in postgraduate medical education and faculty development.

Her academic interest is in medical education. At the University of Ottawa, she served as program director in Nephrology, the Director of the Office of Faculty Development, the Director of PGME Evaluation and Accreditation, and as acting Vice-Dean PGME. She completed a 6 year term as Chair of the Royal College Specialty Committee in Nephrology, and has been a clinical educator at the Royal College since 2011 where she was also an Associate Director for ten years. In that role, she had oversight of 67 specialty and subspecialty committees as well as 40 AFC committees, and a leadership role in their implementation of competency based medical education. Since January 2023, she has been the Director of CBME for the uOttawa PGME office.

Dr. Karpinski graduated from medical school at the University of Saskatchewan and received her RCSPC certification in Internal Medicine and Nephrology after training at Queen's and McGill Universities. She has also completed a renal transplant fellowship at the University of Toronto and a Masters in Medical Education at the University of Dundee.

Mark Rapoport MD, FRCPC

Residency Program Director - Geriatric Psychiatry, University of Toronto



Dr. Mark Rapoport is a Professor and residency program director in the geriatric psychiatry division of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Toronto, past-president of the Canadian Academy of Geriatric Psychiatry (CAGP, 2012-2016), and acting head of Geriatric Psychiatry for Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre. He founded two widely-recognized annual national review courses in geriatric psychiatry, and his main area of research focuses on motor vehicle collisions associated with neurological and psychiatric illness in older adults. He was co-recipient of a 2023 CIHR-Betty Havens Award for Knowledge Translation in Aging for the <u>www.drivinganddementia.ca</u> website.

Saleem Razack MD, FRCPC

Investigator and Critical Care Physician, BC Children's Hospital Professor of Pediatrics, University of British Columbia



Dr. Saleem Razack is a new investigator and critical care physician in the pediatric intensive care unit at BC Children's Hospital, focused on how we teach about race and ways to increase opportunities to incorporate anti-racist practices in education for health professionals. He has investigated how equity, diversity, excellence and meritocracy impact the medical school admissions process, as well as how patients and their families can contribute to the pediatric critical care curriculum. Dr. Razack's work underscores the importance of understanding equity in the context of the role our institutions play in generating injustice.

Dr. Razack is also a professor of pediatrics and a member of the Centre for Health Education Scholarship at the University of British Columbia.

Parveen Wasi MD, FRCPC

Associate Dean - Postgraduate Medical Education, McMaster University Professor, McMaster University



Dr. Parveen Wasi is a professor in the Department of Medicine at McMaster University. She is currently the Associate Dean of Postgraduate Medical Education at McMaster since 2016. She has been a member and Chair of the Royal College Residency Accreditation Committee from 2010 to 2021.

Dr. Wasi completed her undergraduate training and postgraduate medical training at Memorial and McMaster Universities. She practices at the Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre in Hamilton in malignant hematology.

Dr. Wasi 's primary academic focus lies in postgraduate medical education. Prior to her appointment as Associate Dean, PGME, she was the Internal Medicine Program Director (2000-2011).
